

Message from the Roseburg Sister Cities President...

Dear Members and friends,

It is with a heavy heart I must carry forward news from this morning, February 27, 2020, from our friends in Kuki City. It has been decided to officially cancel the upcoming delegation planning to visit Roseburg this June.

Our friends reported the situation in Japan to be stable, but their government is taking strong measures to prevent a similar outbreak as found in neighboring China or South Korea. Kuki City Association President, Kaoru Hirasawa, shared in a message this morning, "This is not a decision that we have easily taken, but under these extraordinary circumstances, we feel it is the correct thing to do." He continued, "We know that some people are already working so hard to organize for our visit. We are very sorry and ask for your understanding."

Our organization shared our thoughts and understanding in a reply this afternoon. We requested them to keep us updated as necessary on activity in the Kuki community. It also was personally noted in my reply for our friends to, "take care and please eat lots of healthy Japanese food to stay strong!"

If you have any thoughts or concerns regarding the delegation, please reply to this email and we will route your needs to the appropriate board member or delegation coordinator. Our board of directors will review any related items at our March meeting in the coming weeks.

- * Traditional Japanese New Year Decorations:



Shime Kazari – Can you spot the plum blossom, crane, lobster or turtle shapes?

Shime Kazari: White rice straw, pine needles, plum blossom, crane, lobster, turtle, new year paper string. These symbolize longevity, good fortune and to rid the area of evil spirits. These are placed at the doorway, just like in the West where you put up a wreath for Christmas! In Japan this is a Shinto custom that you'll see as New Year's decoration. Nowadays, these are made in many different styles. Kadomatsu: A set of bamboo shoots and pine decoration is traditionally placed at the entrance to serve as the temporary abode of Shinto Gods who come to visit the underworld to bless humans.

Celebration of Literacy for Children











RSC Book Club News

Lewis M. Paulson 1925 ~ 2020

Former President of Roseburg Sister Cities, Lewis Paulson passed away in Roseburg on February 10, 2020 at the age of 94. Lewis was born in 1925 in Nye, Wisconsin into a family



of Norwegian and Swedish immigrants.

Throughout his life, Lewis believed in contributing to his community. He actively participated as a member of Faith Lutheran Church, as a board member of Douglas County Senior Services, with Mercy Foundation, Roseburg Community Concert Association, Roseburg Concert Chorale, Rotary International, and with our Roseburg Sister Cities international exchange program with Shobu (now Kuki City), Japan.

Lewis believed in building understanding and friendship with other countries and, along with his wife Beverly and their family, hosted students and teachers from Australia, Guatemala, Norway, Russia and Sweden as well as hosting visiting dignitaries from Japan.

His many contributions to Roseburg Sister Cities over this past quarter-century include; serving on the RSC Board of Directors, hosting delegates from Japan in his home, as the President of Roseburg Sister Cities in 2001, and as an RSC international Delegate to Japan. Lewis performed all of those duties with his usual intelligence, grace and charm. He will certainly be missed.

Survivors include his wife Beverly; son John Paulson of Roseburg; daughter Sarah Paulson Nevue and her husband Bo Nevue of Portland, plus many grandchildren, nieces, nephews and families. A Celebration of Life service and reception will be held at Faith Lutheran Church, 820 West Kenwood Street, Roseburg, OR on Saturday, June 20th at 2:00 pm. Former Kuki Roseburg Association President's Life Celebrated



Tuesday, March 31.



Our good friend in Japan, Eiji Arai, has passed away. Arai-san was the president of the Kuki Roseburg Association from 2008 to 2018. He passed away on March 25, 2020 at the age of 83. He was suffering from kidney disease and had been receiving dialysis treatments in a hospital

for quite a long time.

Arai-san joined the Delegations to Roseburg many times and he and his wife, Hamako, hosted Roseburg Delegates almost every year since the Exchanges began in 1994. His favorite activities in Douglas County included meeting the mayor, police and fire



chiefs, as well as wearing a cowboy hat and riding a horse.







Those from Roseburg Sister Cities who stayed with him and his wife, Hamako, enjoyed his family and their beautiful home around a garden courtyard. RSC treasurer, Kevin Carson, fondly recalls how Arai-san purchased a large 20 foot bowling pin from a bowling alley that closed, and they watched as his son used their electric business' boom truck to lift it in place as a sign for their business! All this was done with father and son communicating and installing it just a few feet away from an intricate family shrine he had built.

Many Roseburg Delegates remember BBQs that Eiji-san and Hamakosan hosted at their home and shared their large inflatable Ghost and Ghoul to celebrate at Halloween, as well as making traditional Mochi, oysters from Noheji and delicious Japanese food. Singing karaoke and sharing his magic shows were his well known pastimes with delegates, who appreciated the joy these brought to all audiences.

Arai-san took guests in Japan to the Buddhist temple where he attended, showing his families' graves, and his beautiful donated incense burner as well as a large bronze statue. During this visit he shared prayers for the victims of the tsunami and arranged for his guests to have tea with Fuse, a visiting priest from Kyoto.

Arai-San is survived by his wife, Hamako, daughter, Kiyomi, son, Takayuki and his wife, Masami, and their two children, Koto and Siun. The Arai family had a small family funeral due to the coronavirus. (The Japanese government has asked citizens not to have any big events, meetings, or gatherings.) Roseburg Sister Cities arranged for flowers at the funeral on Monday, March 30 and
