

Homestay in Japan

Japan is an amazing country with magnificent Mt. Fuji; famous and historical temples and shrines, some thousands of years old; beautiful countryside, gardens, architecture; and with culture and traditions steeped

in hundreds of years blending old with new. Nancy Wolgamott and I (Charlotte Carter) had the privilege of being



hosted by Hiroko Kojima. This was her second time of hosting visitors. She first hosted Maureen and Dave Williams in 2017 and then came to Roseburg in 2018



and stayed with Maureen and Dave. Hiroko is the CEO of a Water Treatment Plant, where she works with two of her three sons. She doesn't speak a lot


of English, but fortunately, we both had electronic translators, our "cheat sheets" from Eric Olson's classes, and her second son, Ryo (Leo), who speaks English and was our translator for most of our outings. Hiroko lives in a beautiful, traditional, three story home filled with art, photos, and collections. Nancy and I were amazed when she showed us an electronic trap door in the kitchen opening to an underground storage and pantry. We slept on tatami mats on the floor, a new experience for both of us and were quite comfortable.



Hiroko, her son, Ryo, and her grand-daughter, Churi Chi, took Nancy and I by train to Tokyo where we toured the Sensoji Temple, rode in

jinrikisha throughout Tokyo, ate sushi, deep-fried squid, and many other delicacies, then visited the Tokyo Sky Tree for a birds-eye view of the city.

The next day Ryo drove us to Nikko where we visited the massive and beautiful Toshogu Shrine. We were able to listen to electronic English translator devices, sharing the history and meaning of each building in the Shrine. We climbed



well over 200 steps, all up hill, to view the beautiful burial site.

After another wonderful traditional Japanese meal, we headed to Nikko Oyo Stone factory where they literally have been cutting stone of all sizes for



hundreds of years to build houses, fences, etc. walls, mountain had gigantic caverns larger than football fields that are now used for weddings, music venues, and tours.

Hiroko is a fabulous cook. We ate traditional Japanese foods with chopsticks, seated on cushions on the floor at a low table in her home. Every meal was beautifully prepared and arranged. Some of our many delicious foods included: miso soup, sushi, sashimi, makizushi, yuba, Sukiyaki with Kobe Beef, pickled eggplant and leeks, edamame, yuba, tofu, rice,

persimmon, fresh pears, pudding served in an egg shell, a caramelized peanut dish, ramen, squid, natto, а sweet jello/pudding dish, and green tea.



As Charlotte was celebrating her birthday while in Japan, Hiroko scheduled us for a photoshoot in kimonos. We selected the kimonos and an obj and



were assisted with our hair and makeup and then taken downstairs to a professional photographer. Hiroko presented both Nancy and I with the finished

RSC to Receive Ginkgo Tree from Hiroshima




RSC will be receiving a ginkgo seedling from the trees that survived the bombing 74 years ago in Hiroshima, Japan. Hiroshima residents have been sharing seeds from those survivor trees around the world, seeing them as messengers of peace. We learned a couple months ago that the Oregon Department of Forestry was offering these seedlings to cities and schools. About 30 ginkgo seedlings had germinated in Oregon and were available.

RSC submitted a proposal partnering with UCC to obtain one of these seedlings. UCC President Deborah Thatcher was excited about the possibility as was their Director of Facilities and their arborist. Because of our partnership with UCC and our sister city relationship with Kuki City, Japan, the RSC proposal was the highest rated proposal in the state and will be receiving a seedling.

2020 marks the 75th anniversary of the bombing and the end of World War II. The best time for planting the seedling is in February, but a ceremony marking the planting will come later, possibly in April.

October 2019 Bus Trip to Mt. Fuji

The focus of the three day bus trip was Mt. Fuji, but the weather was certainly not cooperating on this Tuesday morning with remnants of a recent typhoon



passing through. We headed out from Shobu City Hall, southwest to the city of Shizuoka on the coast of Japan. We stopped for lunch at Jaws Restaurant on

the industrial waterfront of Shizuoka City. It was a popular place with more delicious food choices on the

buffet than you could ever want and then some time for shopping. Getting back to the bus, the rains had stopped and everyone was excited that Mt. Fuji had made an appearance through layers of clouds across the bay.

We boarded the ferry that took us (and the bus) across Suruga Bay to the Izu Peninsula where our hotel was located. The ferry route is actually a designated road, Route 223, Fujisan. We were treated to the more luxurious upper level with beautiful views of the bay and of Mt. Fuji.

Fuji and Suruga Bay. As the bus made its way up the valley and into the mountains, we rounded a corner and Mt. Fuji was in front of us, with the first snow of the

season on its peak. At the Skywalk, the faint of heart stayed at the shops while the rest walked across.

Hotel Kaneyamaen was beautiful inside and out. After arriving, we had tea in the garden tea house and then sake along the stream while enjoying the gardens softly lit at dusk by bamboo lanterns. wonderful dinner, multiple onsens to choose from, and a taiko drum performance in the lobby rounded out the evening.

Not being able to see the view, we focused on mailing post cards from the post office with an array of Japanese stamps available, the gift shop, and the Fujisan Komitake Shrine, a small but beautiful Shinto shrine set in the golden larches. There a Kannushi carefully painted a goshuin entry in our temple book.

The next day we awoke to low clouds that obscured Fuji while some enjoyed early morning soak in the rooftop onsen. But still we made our way up Mt. Fuji enjoying the colored fall leaves and even the Japanese larch trees turning golden. The end of the road was at the Fifth Station



Then back down the mountain fabulous udon noodle lunch and a highlight for many, Kitaguchi Hongu Fuji Sengen Shrine. https://sengenjinja.jp/ english/index.html



This shrine set amongst ancient Japanese Cedars with beautiful stone lanterns and temples is the

traditional starting point for climbing Mt. Fuji. We could have staved here for hours but we were headed back to Kuki with a stop along the way in old town Kawagoe



lined with multiple small traditional shops selling crafts, woodblock prints, bean paste cakes, and green matcha tea.

This was a wonderful trip thanks to the excellent planning, trusted interpreters, thoughtful companions, and great bus driver from Japan. Many of these are repeat travelers with us over the years, and we owe them all many thanks!


