The Roseburg Sister Cities organization has received a commendation from the Consular Office of Japan in Portland, Oregon. The following is an excerpt from the letter received by Mayor Larry Rich on January 14, 2016:

"I hope the New Year finds you well and ready to face the challenges of 2016. Please see the enclosed Consul General's Commendation in recognition of your sister-city relationship with Japan.

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It is an exciting time now for the Kuki Team. Besides the anticipation of our trip to Japan in July, we are in the middle of our recruiting phase. Each year the program adds ten new members to the Team. It is especially intriguing this year since we have added other area middle schools to our group. We have had promising responses from both Glide Middle School and Lincoln Middle School in Oakland. Recruiting has been difficult due to the cost and parents' concern over international travel. We may not reach our full capacity of twenty students, but it appears we will have no less than sixteen.

Fundraising is ongoing since the expense can be difficult for many families. It costs about \$2,500 per student to travel and host. The flower baskets will be available from mid-April until the beginning of July. We are also hoping to sponsor a pancake breakfast at Applebee's at the beginning of June. Compassion and Respect Roseburg Sister City Trip to Kuki-city, Japan

Taking shoes off at the front door, bowing, giving and receiving gifts when meeting new friends, using chopsticks to eat meals that were as good to eat as they were beautiful to gaze upon, and being driven around on the opposite side of the road: all became a regular part of each day for nineteen Roseburg residents who stayed in Shobu, Japan for nine days this past October as part of the Sister City delegation between Roseburg and Kuki-city. This was the first trip to Japan for many of the 2015 delegation who took cultural and language classes to prepare before leaving. The residents also took many gifts with them, some which were handmade as they were told how these are received with much enthusiasm by their Japanese hosts.

Roseburg residents were paired with a host family and stayed in their home. Some homes were more traditional with tatami mats, futons for beds, dinner tables closer to the ground with pillows or short stools to sit upon, while other homes had more similarities to western homes with couches and regular dining tables and beds.

For the first two days in Japan, residents spent time getting to know their host families and each family planned activities for their guests. Some toured around Shobu/Kuki-city exploring the park with its large lake, the three story mall, Shinto and Buddhist temples, city hall with a forestry exhibit, the local library and restaurants. Many families took their guests outside of the city to nearby gardens, forest trails, and temples tucked away in the country. Mary Bosch and Andrew Apter visited such a Buddhist temple where they were treated to a lunch with each artistically prepared dish having a poem or prayer accompanying it. Other delegates rode the train into popular spots in Tokyo, an hour away, touring temples, the aquarium, and the 2,080 foot tall observation tower called the Tokyo Sky Tree. Roseburg residents were relieved that a host or their friend accompanied them and knew English even on these family trips.



The mayor of Kuki-city, Mr. Kenji Tanaka, hosted a welcome party on the first evening in Japan at the Toresen, Farmers Training Center. Some host families dressed their women guests in kimonos, adding to

the authenticity of the experience. Small flags from each country were displayed on the tables with flowers of the season and a full buffet of traditional Japanese foods. The Roseburg delegation prepared a song about rivers, forests and mountains of the Umpqua Valley to the tune of 'This Land is Your Land' and sang to the group of city officials, host families, and Kuki volunteers. Mayor Tanaka welcomed everyone as he remembered his recent and first trip in August 2015 to Roseburg and to UCC where he signed the new sister city proclamation with Roseburg Mayor Larry Rich. Mayor

Tanaka extended a heartfelt message of sorrow to the delegation and to all of the residents of Douglas County for the recent tragedy at UCC. Leader of the Roseburg delegation for 2015, Janet Johnston, thanked the mayor and the hosts for their kind and thoughtful words and hospitality. Each speech was skillfully relayed by volunteer interpreters. A handful of the Roseburg delegation had been to Roseburg before and stayed with other families, so this was a time where everyone met each other and became reacquainted, taking photographs and exchanging small gifts.

Monday, October 12th began a three-day bus trip hosted by the President of the Roseburg-Kuki Association, Mr. Eiji Arai. Joining him was long time member of the Association and photographer extraordinaire, Mr. Shinichi Imamura and several volunteers who made sure every detail was attended to.



The bus took the delegation into the Japanese Alps, northwest of the flat rice fields of Kuki-city. The delegates arrived the first afternoon in the city of Kanazawa and after a traditional lunch, toured the Kenroku-en Gardens. Paths

meandered around lakes with stepping stone bridges, wooden gates, tea houses, and pines with far-reaching branches supported by timbers and bamboo. Next delegates wandered the small street of old Kanazawa with shops and temples tucked in behind other shops. The city is known for its production of gold leaf. Roseburg resident Roy Riggs even stood in line to try ice cream with edible gold leaf; he proclaimed, "it actually was good!"

The second day of the bus trip incorporated other transportation to move the group up the mountain. We all boarded a funicular (an inclined cable car), then another bus outfitted with tire chains that took everyone to lunch at Murodo, a lodge high on the mountain in the clouds, snow and ice. Delegate members were in awe of some bundled up workers heading out of the lodge with ropes around their shoulders and heads, holding large wooden boxes on their backs with fresh broccoli and cabbages in each, perhaps resupplying climbers further up the mountain.



Next, all embarked on a trolley bus that took the group through many tunnels, stopped, and everyone stepped through another tunnel to brilliant blue sky with a view thousands of feet below of Kurobe-ko, a bright, emerald

green lake and the Kurobe Dam holding it in the valley sprinkled with trees and mosses in autumn colors of reds, oranges, and golds. All members have said this view was truly breathtaking. From here a ropeway, which is like an aerial tram, took everyone down to view the lake and dam up close.



Trolleys took the members through many tunnels down the mountain and to the city of Matsumoto, where delegation members were treated to a night at the Hotel 'Shoho', where the Utsukusi-ga-hara hot springs are

located. Women slept in one room and the men in another. All had rooms with tatami mats, sliding paper walls and futons to sleep on with rice pillows and down comforters. To enter public spaces of the hotel, delegates had to don yukatas (a light cotton kimono like robe) and slippers. Delegates reported the dinner was exquisite with at least 10 courses of superb dishes of various fresh fish, tempura vegetables, fondue, and several beautiful desserts. It was here that the Kuki-city residents sang a heartfelt, 'Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star' in Japanese and in English to their Roseburg guests.

Delegate members also enjoyed the relaxation of the crystal clear onsen hot springs at this hotel. Several communal baths of increasing temperatures were available to the guests to soak in; one area for the men and another for the women.

Leaving the Hotel Shoho the following day, delegates had a short stop at Matsumoto Castle. Many recognized this crisp white and black storied castle, surrounded by koi filled pools, white swans floating by, and a bright red, wooden arching bridge, from the image displayed on television coverage during the 1998 Olympics that took place in Japan.



The final day of the bus trip took everyone to Aoki-mura, a town at the base of the mountains. First stop was city hall and a welcome by Aoki-mura mayor, Masao Kitamura. Kind words were shared with everyone including

condolences for the victims, families and community members of the UCC tragedy. Mr. Kitamura gave each delegate a gift on behalf of his city. Delegation leader Janet Johnston shared that Mr. Kitamura had visited Roseburg with the very first Delegation to come to Roseburg, when he was the City Manager of Shobu, and stayed with her and her husband, David.

The day in Aoki-mura unfolded early with a trip to the junior high where the principal greeted everyone and introduced members to the students gathered in the gym. The students entertained the group with singing, taiko drumming and a demonstration of the traditional tea ceremony. Delegation member Rick Randol and his wife, Kathy, remarked that this was their favorite experience of the trip for the student's skills were truly amazing and their singing touched everyone's hearts. Anne Soder, a former teacher in the delegation, reflected on the students' presentation upon returning later to Roseburg, remarking about how disciplined and highly skilled these young people were.



Members of the delegation were bused to lunch at a traditional antique restaurant where everyone was seated around an open fire pit with salmon and tea kettles hanging overhead and thick wooden counters built all around. Delegates, Larry and Loie Concannon, enjoyed the lunch of

soba buckwheat noodles and tempura vegetables and shrimp.

Bused back to Shobu-cho, members were treated to karaoke on the bus led by Mr. Arai and Mr. Imamura. Roseburg members Andrew Apter and Larry Concannon joined their hosts in singing solos. Upon arriving back in Shobu, all members were invited to a delicious dinner at 'Tsumugi', hosted by Mrs. Yasuko Koyama, her son Yosimasa and and her daughter Kuniko. Mrs. Koyama and her late husband Chiaki have been members of the Association since the beginning and have been to Roseburg several times, most recently staying with Dr. David Soder and his family.



Thursday, October 15th delegates had breakfast with their host families and then met at the Choryuji Temple Kindergarten. Sherlyn Hiatt remarked that this experience was like no other, as members turned the corner and were greeted by 3, 4, and 5 year olds and their teachers waving an American flag in one hand and a Japanese flag in the

other, while calling out to everyone, "hello!" and "welcome!" Delegates walked between the two lines of flag waving children, talking with them as they moved through to the school and temple. These young children enthusiastically presented a delightful choreographed program to music in the school yard using colorful parachutes and shiny pom-poms for the Roseburg delegates. Tours of the classrooms including the English class of five year olds led by former Texas resident Marc Bailey who has taught for twenty years now in Japan. While in his classroom, Sherlyn Hiatt, presented a picture book she wrote and illustrated about the Sister City experience to the school. She made sure a translated version was created for the children to enjoy too.

A lighthearted tradition has existed over the years with the delegation exchange of bringing Mr. Bailey's favorite American food, boxed macaroni and cheese, on each trip. Almost at the end of his dynamic English lesson focused on Halloween words and concepts, Rick Randol and Dan Withers started the Roseburg members handing out surprise boxes of macaroni and cheese to him and his young students' delight and gratitude.

The kindergarten students demonstrated Taiko drumming skills to Roseburg residents seated on the gymnasium stage and once finished, each child walked up the stairs to greet their new found American friends with gifts. Roseburg delegates, Gail Withers

and Loie Concannon had planned individual gifts for all of the students from the Sister City group that included suckers and shiny gold medals to wear around their necks.



Leaving the school, delegates passed by beautifully carved Buddhist statues lining the walkways. Roseburg artist HD Honscheid and his wife, Una, listened intently as the interpreter explained the history of each statue. Before

entering the Buddhist temple, delegates were invited to cleanse their lips and hands with spring fed water, which is a Japanese tradition before entering a Buddhist Temple. Shoes were exchanged upon entering the temple for slippers to wear through the long corridor leading to the large temple hall. Jeannie Burpee had stayed previously in the temple living quarters with the Shimazaki family. Sadly, Mr. Tatsuo Shimazaki, the Head Priest of the Temple which was a 4th generation for his family, passed away only a couple of weeks before our arrival. However, his son continues as the priest now and he led the group in prayers and a ceremony honoring the victims of the UCC tragedy. At the end of the ceremony delegation members were invited to burn incense and say prayers for our community beside the beautiful altar and flowers. Many also paid their respects to Mr. Shimazaki at a separate altar set up in his memory.

Leaving the hall, mothers of the kindergartners, dressed in colorful kimonos, greeted the Oregon guests to serve them tea and sugar treats in crisply folded origami boxes along with origami folded flowers and animals.



The afternoon of day seven, Roseburg residents participated in a calligraphy class led just for them by an experienced and highly awarded calligraphy artist, Nobuko Imamura. Each resident was provided rice paper,

a stone and black ink with a bamboo brush, and instructions to take home to Roseburg for practice. Each member was invited by the instructor to come up to her table where she complimented each person and used her red chop to stamp her Japanese symbol in the corner by our names. Shinichi Imamura photographed each delegate with their creation that day. Later, before leaving Shobu and Kuki-city, each delegate was surprised with their best calligraphy matted in a patterned frame to carry home.

Day eight of the autumn stay in Japan began at the Kuki Bunka Kaikan (Culture Hall) to view the Calligraphy Exhibit. Though delegates could not read the scrolls displayed, the various



brushwork done in varying sizes and styles appeared to enthrall the members, especially since everyone had just experienced the challenge of doing calligraphy the day before. From the exhibit, members were bused along the 'educational street' named by Yasuko Koyama and on to the 'Togyoku Ningyo Kaikan' (Doll museum with Hina Dolls and other dolls for the Boys' Festival). Following the tour of finely crafted exhibits and the doll making workshop, delegates were taken to 'Keibunkan' (a martial arts place) to view adults engaged in the dramatic martial art of Kendo. The day ended with Mayor Tanaka bidding good-bye to everyone at the city hall again, where he posed for a group photograph and passed on through Roseburg Sister City Treasurer, Kevin Carson, a sealed letter for Roseburg Mayor Larry Rich.

The Sister City stay came to an end on day nine with a Farewell Party at Toresen (the Farmer's Training Center Hall). Here Delegation Co-Leader Janet Johnston bid good-bye and Co-Leader Kevin Carson expressed gratitude from the Roseburg delegates:



"This trip has been wonderful. We wish to thank everyone in the Kuki-Roseburg Association for all the time spent planning the bus trip and all of our activities during our stay. Your kindness and hospitality to each of us is
